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PATTERN FOR A PERFORATOR

Over the last year or so a number of people have suggested patterns for a Club perforator. One member suggested that any design adopted should reflect the Australian <u>and</u> New Zealand origins and structure of the Club. Ray Everett, one of our British members sent a number of possible designs and these are shown below:



Lindsay Armstrong suggested the Southern Cross or a star representing one of the stars from the Southern Cross.

HB/CO on 1d RED

The following additional items were reported:

Two additional KGV 1d red die III issues both with Tasmanian postmarks, one of which had a legible postmark-Launceston 7/10/1919

A number of KGV 1d red die I's were reported with either Launceston or Victorian postmarks. A copy of this perfin on a 6d Roo with a Melbourne postmark 22/2/1917 with <u>ho</u> missing pin was also reported

So far all the die III's reported have had Tasmanian postmarks!

KGV SURVEY

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The first part of the results for the KGV survey will cover those issues with C OF A watermark. The results for the issues with other watermarks will follow next issue as I am waiting for replies to a couple of queries.

A total of 15 members surveyed their collections and sent in their survey forms. Some of the best collections of State Government officials were surveyed as well as some collections of more modest scope. However there are a number of good collections that I am aware of that were not represented. Nevertheless the results do provide a most useful idea of the scarcity of issues as well as identifying a few previously unreported issues.

It is important to remember when looking at the results that these totals are not an accurate measure of the total number of copies of a particular items but a measure of relative scarcity.

The interpretation of these figures and their usage to provide some guide to price is a matter on which some will disagree.

Bearing in mind that the survey was of 15 collections only, the following ratings suggest themselves:

Rare - 1 to 5 copies i.e. only in a few collections Scarce- 6 to 20 copies i.e. in most but not all collections Fairly Common- 21 to 50 copies i.e. should be fairly easy to obtain Very Common- 51 + copies

The apparent scarcity of the SCC pattern may be related to the fact that few collectors are interested in this pattern.

This table shows two expected 'trends' a) the scarcity of inverted and reversed patterns. b) the scarcity of perfins on the 1/2d,1 1/2d and 1/4 values.

KGV survey cont.

Another aspect of interest is the situation relating to the scarcity of the OS/NSW and OS(12 holes in the S) patterns on the 1d and 2d values. These items have often been regarded as rare but the number of copies reported indicates that while they are fairly scarce it would be quite reasonable for most collectors to obtain copies.

NEW ZEALAND PERFIN LISTING

We have collated information and illustrated the perfins of New South Wales, South Australia, Queensland, Tasmania and Western Australia in the bulletin and seem to have produced quite useful listings. It is appropriate to turn some attention to the perfins of New Zealand.

The most recent New Zealand perfin catalogue was produced some years ago and has long been unavailable. Since it's publication a number of philatelic perfins have appeared and there have been a number of new discoveries. If we were to produce such a listing it appears likely that this would help stimulate reports of new items and also encourage interest in New Zealand perfins.

It would be m_{OS} t useful to receive comments from members as to the aspects that need to be covered.

Most collectors of New Zealand perfins worldwide collect them on a non specialised basis. These collectors, and I include myself in this group, need a listing and illustration of patterns, user identification, postmarks and usage dates and if possible a scarcity rating. For the specialist New Zealand Perfin collector additional information such as detail about missing pins are of interest. Such information was provided by Robert Samuel in his book New Zealand stamps with Perforated Initials published in 1968.

It is interesting to note the influence of the above book on the collecting habits of NZ perfin collectors and the heavy interest in the foreign perfins with a NZ conection, so engendered.

It would be fairly easy to produce a listing of New Zealand perfins in a similar way to that used for the Australian States and to survey collections to confirm the rarity of patterns. To produce a detailed monograph for the New Zealand specialist will take considerably longer.

A few aspects to consider a) Should revenue usage be separated from postal usage ? b) How much detail is needed for the British NZ pattern ,the only New Zealand official? A very detailed listing may be appropriate here.

c) Is it better to note varieties, such as missing pins, only and deal with these at a later stage?d) Should dates of usage be related to particular locations rather

than the pattern in general where a pattern was used at a number of locations?

e) How much detail is appropriate for the foreign perfins with a New Zealand connection? We have described/illustrated a number of such patterns used in the Australian States previously not listed in the earlier NZ catalogues.

Over to you for your comments.


MEMBERSHIP

TRAMWAY PERFIN REVISITED

There has been quite a bit of information provided in response to the article in the January 1990 issue, by Ivor Stockwell, Derek Pocock and John Mathews.

Ivor reports a TB issue with 7 holes in the B on a KGV 1d green small multi watermark p.13 1/2 X 12 1/2 issue. This pattern is illustrated at the right. He suggests that the B may have had 8 pins. From here the story gets harder to follow.



A range of issues with the B having 6 holes were reported:



Again Ivor had a couple of interesting items to report

KGV1 1/2d redsingle watermark with the 5 hole BKGV1 1/2d redsmall multi watermark p.13 1/2 x 12 1/2 with a3 hole T and a 6 hole B -illustrated below.



Unfortunately dated postmarks do not appear on theses items so that we can only guess as to their date of usage.

So far all KGV issues with C of A watermark have had the 5 hole B.

Bearing in mind that the machine used was a single die only it looks like this die suffered repeated damage and was repaired on at least one occasion. A possible sequence for the number of holes in the T and B could be:

4,7 ----> 4,6 ----> 3,6 ----> 4,5

How the single watermark issue fits in is at present uncertain.

Quite a few questions still need to be answered:

- a) Was there an 8 hole B ?
- b) What was the true sequence of pin damage? We will need postmarked issues to establish this sequence.
- c) What was the original die ?

Two other patterns may have some bearing on this pattern:

Derek writes "Of further interest is the possible identity of the other TB perfin (7,13). I have three copies on stamps of the 1920's and they also show progressive deterioration. A full Tramway Perfin Revisited cont.

strike on SG77 1 1/2d then deteriorates by missing pins 2 and 4 in the upright of the T as found on SG62 of 1922 and then the 1 1/2d SG61 is missing, in addition, a total of 5 pins in the B." Can anyone confirm the identity of this earlier TB pattern and date the progressive wear of the pins ? Does anyone have a 'missing link'between this pattern and the Tramways Board perfin ?



Judith Sidaway came across the V.B perfin above on a 1d KGV small multi watermark issue that appears to have a similar lettering style to the TB pattern. Does anyone have any information about this one ?

Essential if you collect Romanian or world perfins.



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

Additional South Australian Issues with perfins

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EXHIBITING PERFINS by P Engelbrecht

My exhibit consists of 8 frames each containing 16 pages. Each page has as a minimum the following: a) the perfin picture b) a cover or a card with the identification of the user of the machine in question. If the name is on the reverse I place a photocopy of the name and address (eventually diminished) just above the cover. Under the cover I provide the tarriff at the time of posting. C) betwwen these two most important items I mount an appropriate number of perfinned stamps of that company. Each stamp should have a cancellation that is legible as to place and date. Apart from the cancellation I choose the earliest and the most recent stamps from my collection. Under the stamps I place information as to the earliest and latest known dates of usage for this perfin and if a permit was given by the Postmaster Generals


Office(1876-1917 in Denmark but after 1917 free) this is noted with the relevant journal number.

This exhibit has achieved a grand silver award in Denmark which is 73 out of a maximum of 100 points (Had I gained 75 points it would have meant a Vermeil award and thereby access to International Exhibitions).

If in doubt as to the quality of the item at hand do not use it -choose only the best. Mounting loose stamps should not be done with black pockets. What you should do is the following: Cut the back of a black pocket into the size just a few millimeters smaller than the stamp. Glue the black paper to the back of a glassine pocket and you will have nice framing without "mourning".
