While many of us complain about the rises in prices for many perfins in Australia and New Zealand many of the most interesting finds are being made on inexpensive stamps and found in accumulations of very common stamps. That there is a high likelyhood for most perfin collectors to find rare and unusual material must be one of the prime attractions to collecting in this area. I do not think I have ever seen a perfin collection, no matter how small, that does not contain some scarce material.

There are still many sources of perfins such as local non-perfin collectors, part-time dealers, accumulations in auctions and overseas collectors of perfins or non-perfins that are useful for the inexpensive material that rarities are made of. While it does take a fair bit of effort to constantly seek out new sources, new contacts and arrange new exchanges the results amply repay the effort. Even when the results are poor the chase can be enjoyable and thats what counts.

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NORPEX 91 John Grant

For the first time ever, an Australian Philatelic exhibition is to include a special exhibition category for perfins. This will occur at NORPEX 91 to be held in Newcastle in October 1991. The addition of this new exhibition category results from a suggestion made at a meeting of Club members last year. Hopefully, there will be a good number of exhibits from Club members to support NORPEX 91 and promote our interest in perfins.

Exhibiting is not only good fun, it is also the best way to share your interest with other philatelists, to encourage new collectors to the field and to advance the status of perfin collectingofficials, semi officials and private perfins.

If you need some encouragement to enter NORPEX 91, consider these points. Exhibiting is not difficult: it simply requires thought, to work out the best theme for the material you have available, and patience to ensure the best presentation of the material. Some Norpex 91 cont.

possible themes for exhibits were discussed in the May 1990 edition of the Club Bulletin, but it takes little imagination to develop better themes, which may be more suited to your material.

The title page of an exhibit should provide an outline and describe the objective in the exhibit. Exhibits must also conform to the requirements described in the NORPEX prospectus - minimum of 30 standard size pages etc. Copies of the prospectus are available from Mark Jurisich on (049) 63-1332 or (049) 29-2880. Apart from these requirements, there are no other prescribed standards for the exhibition of perfins. It is up to the exhibitor to decide whether to use stamp hinges or plastic mounts, whether to display stamps always in the upright position, regardless of the orientation of the perfin, whether to include covers etc. If you are in doubt as to how to go about preparing an exhibit, call another exhibitor or Club member to discuss it.

Let's hope for a good turnout of exhibits from Club members at NORPEX 91, but please act quickly. Entries close on 15 May 1991.


With regret we report the passing of two of our foreign members.

Peter Engelbrecht died suddenly on November 2,1990. Peter was one of the pioneers in developing the collecting of Danish perfins. He produced the Hanbog over Danske Firmaperforeringer-Handbook on Danish Perfins and the journal The Perfinist no.1-13 which was concerned mainly with Danish perfins.

Jim Catterick passed away peacefully on February 13 1991 after a long fight with cancer. Jim was for many years the editor of the Perforator, the newsletter of the British North America Philatelic society Perfin Study Group, his contribution to collecting in this area was most significant.

NZ FROM ITALY

Peter Moore has discovered the perfin illustrated at the right. This NZ perfin is found on a 1932 10th Anniversary of The March on Rome. SG354 issue. Does anyone have any information about the user of this pattern or about other issues so punctured?



NZ Census

Gordon Passau has indicated a desire to help produce an updated scarcity rating for New Zealand perfins. Apparently he will be able to send out a large number of survey sheets with his normal mailings. When this survey sheet is available we will ensure that members will get copies. Enid Honiss has volunteered to collate the returns. This venture will be a most important step in collecting information about NZ perfins.

VG PERFIN USED IN QUEENSLAND D.W. Andersen

Sorting through a large pile of KGV low value perfins a strip of three VG perfins caught my eye. Nothing very unusual except that they were postmarked Townsville,QLD 6SE37. While I had come across Tasmanian T perfins with non Tasmanian postmarks this is the first VG perfin with non-Victorian postmark I've so far seen. Any explanations or similar issues seen?

C OF A PERFIN ON GB STAMPS Dr. D.A. Pocock

Occurring as it does in the two formats either horizontal or vertically arranged this should receive a fuller annotation than I can find available in the literature. Basically I believe we should list those definitives and values on which each perfin has been recorded. as an initial series I would list the following extreamly inadequate list of stamps on which these two perfins are found.

1) Horizontal C of A found on George the Fifth penny red, four, six penny, half crown and five shillings of 1921 and the two pence half penny UPU of 1929.

2) Vertical'C'above'of'above'A', George the Fifth one penny, George the Sixth(pale colour) penny red, the three penny, the shilling, also the four pence blue, and red, the half crown green five shillings and one pound(first) George the Sixth high values, on Queen Elizabeth the second, the six penny Wilding and the 1/- ILO of 1969.

Readers should I am sure be able to extend this list considerably to give us a comprehensive range of the stamps on which these perfins are found.

(Editors Note: In a future issue of the bulletin we will list the issues known with these patterns and the sources of information so far published. This is an area in which many have some interest)

There has been quite a bit of discussion relating to buying a perforator for the Club.

At the Sydpex 88 meeting it was first suggested that the Club acquire it's own perforator and that a competition could be held to design a pattern. The Stampshow 89 meeting authorised the executive to proceed with the purchase of a suitable perforator when Club funds were available. At NZ 1990 the meeting discussed the need for feedback from the New Zealand members on the perforator and pattern to be used.

A number of patterns have been suggested over the years and these are illustrated at the end of this article.


Initial enquiries to the former producers of machines in the United States, Cummins Allison Corporation and the American Perforator Co. brought the response from both companies that they no longer produce such perforators. Recent enquiries by Dr Derek Pocock have identified a source of perforators.

J. Sloper & Co., the first perforator manufacturers are still producing perforating machines suitable for perforating postage They have suggested two models that might be suitable for stamps. our needs:

HP1 a hand perforating punch most suitable for up to 2 letters priced at E97-10.

no.2 a more familiar type suitable for up to 4 letters priced at 玉214-44

(Prices do not include carriage and packing)



MODEL 2 Base 71 x 3" Nett weight 10 lbs Max. die arca 21 across x 21 deep

The Club is now in a position to afford a perforator and it appears that the most suitable model is the number 2 model as it allows for a number of letters. While it is a considerable expense it may be possible to recoup part of the initial cost by producing"First day of Use Covers" and such like.

A couple of things need to be decided relating to buying such a perforator.

a) What use perforated stamps will be used for- official correspondence

material

-souvenirs/promotional -bulletin mailings -available for individual


members to have stamps perforated Please let the editor have your comments about which of these uses you feel is appropriate.

b) What pattern ?

TATTERSALL UNDERPRINTS

Some additional information has come to light about these underprints following the January issue of the Bulletin which contained a query about them from Colin Salt.

John Fordham sent photocopies of a number of copies on KGV sideface issues on single, small multi and CofA watermarked paper. A clear copy of the Tatter-/sall underprint used on these issues and of one with the "sall" omitted are shown below.





A different type of underprint illustrated at the right was reported by Bryan Toop. It is on a 1 1/2d red KGV small multi wmk p.13 1/2 with a Hobart postmark. The underprint is in purple.



Additional information is recorded in the Cinderella Corner of Stamp News.

In the October 1988 issue the method of production is described:

The 'overprints 'were applied by stencil. The word Tattersall was typed a number of times on a paper stencil and sheets (or half sheets) of postage stamps were fed through the stencilling machine face down so that the 'overprints 'were applied in a rather haphazard fashion on to the gum on the backs of the stamps. The liquid used in this operation contained an acid that etched the 'overprint' through the gum on to the actual paper of the stamps, so that the impression remains when the gum is washed off.

In the December 1988 issue more information about which issues were underprinted. The following issues with underprints are reported: 2 1/2d KGVI 1942-49 series


8d Tiger Cat 2/- Flannel Flower 1/- & 2/- 1956 Olympic Games

The 1/- issue had the underprint in a continuous pattern in four lines reading GEO ADAMS TATTERSALL (The informant also thought that they had seen an underprint on the 4d & 7 1/2d values of the 1956 Olympic Games set but had since mislaid the items)

It would appear that these underprints were used for a considerable period, probably on a considerable number of issues, certainly from the early 1920's (probably earlier) to at least 1960. A number of different'patterns' have been used. These underprints in combination with the earlier A perfins would make a very interesting display of Tattersall use of security methods on postage stamps.

SG OPERATOR

Bryan Magee writes "From 1951 to 1954 I worked for Sargood Gardiner Ltd, Wholesale Softgoods Merchants of 61-73 Flinders Lane, Melbourne. Part of my duties as a Junior involved perforating and affixing stamps to the day's mail. I am positive that the first two patterns illustrated below are Sargood Gardiner but am unsure of the third. Do you know of any other company using the SG perfin ?"

PRICING PERFINS by Barry Clarke

There has been a lot of paper used on this subject so I am putting pen to paper to add my opinion.

Perforated stamps cannot be sold by dealers to the "normal" stamp collector, they are damaged stamps and only qualify as "space-fillers". As our editor recently reported, none of the rare perfins appear on anything but the common low value stamps, the postal rate of the day. Therefore it seems logical to me that the rarity of the perfin is the controlling factor in setting the price.

The perfin collector who "collects one of each value" is in a slightly different position, but not much. If there are a lot of different values of stamps with that perfin, it is not very rare, or, the rarity factor of that stamp with perfin should set the price.

While there are only about 100 members in our club we can safely assume that there are only maybe ten times that many people in our area who collect perfins seriously and most of them will not pay the prices being asked "just because it is a perfin". Pricing perfins cont.

If there are 10,000 copies of any particular perfin, a copy should not cost more than the unperfinned stamp. It is only when there are only 10 with that punch that the price should go up. One step further, the "spacefiller" should come through at the usual 10% of catalogue.

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LITERATURE REVIEWS

<u>Catalog of Bavarian Perfins</u> by John Needham, Robert Schwerdt and Mewhinney eds. Published by the Perfins Club 1990 A4 size. Card Covers. Supplied looseleaf and punched for a 3 ring binder.

Consists of a main catalog section and 2 appendices. The main catalog section lists and illustrates perfins found on Bavarian stamps with and without the Deutsches Reich overprints. The appendices list the official/semi official perfins of Bavaria by Scott numbers and list those perfins on Deutsches Reich overprints but not yet reported on unoverprinted stamps (presumably those used outside of Bavaria). Like most perfin catalogues illustrations are found on right-hand pages and information (identity and location) on the facing left hand pages. Measurements of size and number of holes in each pattern are not provided. While some people like to see this information it does not always help in distinguishing between similar patterns. In this catalogue a bit more aid to help distinguish between some patterns would be a help.

In all a most useful 'first edition', though to my way of thinking a bit light on detail. Usage dates, some historical notes about perfin usage in the area and listing the officials/semi officials with a description as well as a catalogue number(for those of us who don't use Scott) would be useful. Still well worth the price.

The Perfins of India and Indian States by Magnus Werner. Published by the Perfins Club 1990 116 pages. A4 size Card Covers. Supplied looseleaf and punched for a 3 ring binder.

The main catalog consists of separate sequences for India, Indian States (Chamba, Faridkot, Gwalior, Hyderabad, Indore, Cochin, Travanchore) Burma, Pakistan and special sections for fiscal stamps and postal stationary. A separate listing of perfins found on the issues of East India is included. Right hand pages in the catalog section illustrate the perfins and the left hand facing pages information about each perfin (postmarks, identification, period of usage (reigns) and clarifying information where needed. To my way of thinking the arrangement of clarifying information in this catalog strikes a good balance between listing all measurements and listing none.

In a word, excellent.





NEW ZEALAND PERFINS PART 2 by R.D. Samuel

GNBLd GREAT NORTHERN BREWERIES LTD, AUCKLAND (1901-1903)

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This is a fairly scarce little perfin. It was used for only a few years, the examples in my collection being postmarked between 20N001 and 23?0C03.

I have seen this perfin only on the 1/2d Mt Cook and 1d Universal.

Rarity rating: F

HB HENRY BERRY & COMPANY, CHRISTCHURCH (1903-1906)

This perfin was used, apparently, between 1903 and 1906, the earliest and latest dates in my collection being, respectively, 7SP03 and 21?SP06.

> Copies in my collection are on the 1/2d Mt Cook, the 1d Universal, and the 2 1/2d First Pictorial. If memory serves me correctly, Mr W.G. Register, of Christchurch, has an example on the 2s First Pictorial.

Rarity rating: E

HD&CO H. DAVIS & COMPANY, NELSON (circa 1875)

This perfin is not recorded in my 1968 book, "New Zealand Stamps with Perforated Initials." The one example in my collection is on a 2d First Sideface (Perf 12 1/2) postmarked with part of the "NN" duplex postmark of Nelson. Mr D.D. Davis (no relation to Mr H. Davis), of the United states, has reported a second copy of this perfin, on the 1d First Sideface (Perf 12 1/2).

The user of this perfin has not been positively identified. An 1875 directory lists a firm, H. Davis & Company, of Bridge Street, Nelson. It is probable that this was the user of this perfin.

Rarity rating: G

HMC&CO H.M. CHISHOLM & COMPANY, AUCKLAND (circa 1908 - circa 1909)

Despite the scarcity of this perfin, my collection shows an interesting range of stamps: the 8d First Pictorial (Perf 14), 6d reduced size Pictorial (Perf 14x15), 1/2d Mt Cook (Perf 14x15), 1d surface printed Universal, and 1/2d King Edward VII. Unfortunately, none of these show a dated postmark and the date of use can only be given as circa 1908-1909.

Rarity rating: F

J NATHAN & CO J. NATHAN & COMPANY, AUCKLAND (1885)

This is another perfin not recorded in my 1968 book. My only copy is a fiscally used 4s "Long Type" Queen Victoria fiscal, cancelled "11/6/85" in manuscript. With the exception of the modern New Zealand Philatelic Federation perfins, this is New Zealand's only "full name" perfin.

Rarity rating: G

K KODAK (AUSTRALASIA) PTY LTD, WELLINGTON (1924-1926)

My collection contains only two examples of this perfin, a "piece" franked with a 1/2d King George V postmarked MY14 1924, and a cover postmarked MY28 1924. David Dell has an example on the 1d Field Marshal (issued 1926).

Although I have only the two copies of this perfin I am aware that copies exist in other collections more often than in other cases where I have only one or two examples of a particular perfin. Accordingly, I rate it as:

Rarity rating: F

M UNIDENTIFIED USER (circa 1903)

This is a problem perfin. My collection contains only the one example and I have always viewed it with a bit of suspicion. The holes are much larger than those normally associated with postage stamp perfins and, if it was not for the "K" perfin (which is very similar) I would be inclined to conclude it had been applied with a punch which had been obtained for some other

purpose. Still, the credientials of my item are impeccible. It was originally in the "Startup" collection and was obtained by Mr Startup at a time when perfin collecting was enjoyed by only a very few collectors; it is certainly not a forgery or an item produce to defraud collectors. So we have to conclude that this is a genuine perfin, used by some unknown business house.

The one stamp I have seen is a 3d First Pictorial (Sideways watermark, Perf 11) from an early printing before the plate became noticeably worn. I would place the date of use as about 1903. The postmark shows the date only as 30MR0-, and dors not show the name of the office.

Many years ago I submitted this perfin to the Royal Philatelic Society of New Zealand. I wished to know if the item was genuine and if there was any way one could ascertain whether the perfin had been applied before the stamp had been postmarked, or after it was postmarked. The reply received stated it was not possible to answer this question. The writer, the late Mr G. Chamberlain, went on to say: "The late James Currie had a similar perfin in his collection, except that there was one less hole in the middle arm of the design. A note over the specimen attributed it to Messrs J. Yaegar & Son. The design was apparently the letter 'Y' between parallel lines."

A search of various directories has failed to identify a firm of the name, J. Yaegar & Son. Nor has the Currie copy of this perfin ever come to light. The problem still remains.

Rarity rating: G

M&CLtd MILNE & CHOYCE LTD, AUCKLAND (circa 1928 - 1940)

This perfin is found only on fiscally used 2d stamps, the 2d King George V, 2d 1935 Pictorial, and 2d 1940 Centennial being represented in my collection. One of my 2d King George V stamps is from the scarce printing on Cowan paper with reversed watermark (circa 1928). My latest example is a 2d 1940 Centennial on part of a receipt, dated 3lJAN1940. Despite the fact that this perfin was used over many years by a large firm I have always found it to be scarce.

Rarity rating: F

MBNZ UNIDENTIFIED USER (circa 1908)

My collection contains only the one example of this perfin, a surface printed ld Universal (circa 1908). A second example has been recorded in the pages of "The New Zealand Stamp Collector." Neither the user, nor even the town or city of use, are known.

Rarity rating: G
