CLUB MEETING

Guidelines for submission of lots are:

- 1. Lots are to be received at the above address by 31 March 1994
- 2. Material submitted is to be adequately packaged, both as individual lots, and as a total package for posting.
- 3. Certified mail, etc., for submitted material to be at vendor's discretion (the Club and auction coordinator cannot accept responsibility for loss or damage in transit to the coordinator).
- 4. Each lot must :
 - a. be clearly identified,
 - b. have a concise, representative description (for the catalogue), and
 - c. have a nominated reserve price.
 - (if the vendor provides a separate summary list of lots so identified and described, a signed copy of the list will be returned as a receipt for the material).
- 5. It is considered that it would be to everyone's advantage to set a minimum reserve for any lot at \$2 (this should still allow for better items to be sold as singles, but encourage "bulk" lots of more common material which are not easy to put in a circuit book).
- 6. A vendor's commission of 10% will be deducted from the selling price of each lot (this will go towards postage for receipts for material submitted and for forwarding of payments).
- 7. Do not forget to include the desired return postal address.

John Mathews reports a couple of additional overprints on State duty stamps.

The example illustrated on the left is a South Australian 1d duty with an AUSTRALIAN/MUTUAL/PROVIDENT/ SOCIETY overprint.

The other overprint he sighted in an auction but was unable to photocopy. The overprint on a Victorian 3d duty cancelled 24/8/1959 of KRAFT/FOODS/LIMITED was sketched and a likeness (slightly enlarged) is shown on the right.

BRITISH NORTH AMERICA PHILATELIC SOCIETY (BNAPEX) 93 REPORT

This convention was held at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto Canada from 3rd September to 5th September 1993. Some 200 frames of some of the finest Canadian philatelic material in existence were exhibited and a bourse of 26 dealers graced the Concert Hall. Unfortunately none of the exhibits were perfins although a few had been used to complement other displays. Canada (like New Zealand) still does not know where perfins belong.

Friday night we attended a seven course Chinese banquet at the Sai Woo restaurant. We were taken by bus but as it was only about 3 or 4 blocks a number of us walked back, mainly to walk off the delicious meal we had over-eaten.

The Society AGM was held next morning at 8.00am and was to be followed by the Perfin Study Group Seminar at 10.00am. Unfortunately the AGM ran overtime, but a few of us left early to attend the Seminar. A total of 11 people attended the seminar, two new members joining there to bring the membership of the Study group to 50.

Jon Johnson gave a "slide-show" talk on the 4-hole and 5-hole

OH/MS perforators. A real specialist who knows his subject and can express himself clearly. I took the opportunity to hand out some of the 4c Amethyst "THANK/YOU" perfins that Dick Armstong of the NZ Philatelic Federation had given to me to distribute. These were very appropriate as at the Awards Banquet on Sunday evening a small piece of amethyst crystal was beside every place. A lot of amethyst is mined in Ontario.

I dined a couple of times with Jon Johnson, a most pleasant person. He is a bit disappointed with the non-recognition of perfins in the "exhibition" world. The best he can ever expect is a Gold for an entry with 18 "A" rated perfins. There are less than three known copies of these "A" rated items and in most cases ONLY ONE KNOWN COPY.

Sunday afternoon I was taken for a drive around the city by fellow perfinner Owen White and wife as I had been asked by an Auckland friend to take some photos of his ancestors home. The house was no longer there but he was happy with the pics I took of nearby properties.

There is a lot of interest in New Zealand philately in North America and I have quite a list of "wouldya couldyas" to fill. It was great to meet so many I'd met in Vancouver 2 years ago, this time as old friends. To see Ritchie Toop receive "The Order of the Beaver" and to have a ride on the old ferry I used to ride to work, 40 years ago.

GWALIOR STAMPED PAPER PERFIN

Some time ago I showed John Mathews a revenue stamped paper from Gwalior (India) with a GWALIOR GOVERNMENT/STAMP DEPARTMENT perfin and a separate date perfin. When he last visited the UK he had the opportunity to examine some of the record books from Slopers now held by the Perfin Society. These are some of the work books/order books in which Slopers recorded details of orders and samples of perfins produced.

He noticed an entry in one of these books for the Gwalior patterns I had shown him. Kindly he made a copy for me, which is reproduced on the next page.

Two machines no.64650 and 64651 were supplied to the Gwalior State Government by Slopers. The order (no.484) was received on 3/6/1930, was processed on work ticket 4362 and delivered/sent on 30/6/1930.

The machine for the larger perfin(no.64650) was a no.3 screwfly machine operated by a screw press rather than a lever. The date machine was a different kettle of fish, the details being provided in the workbook. In the description is the mention " + one year 30" which refers to Slopers practice of producing year dies that would slide into the head containing the day/month dies. A great deal of Slopers business was producing such machines for non postal purposes.

NEW ZEALAND PERFINS

SE&Co

New Zealand Philatelic Brokers Ltd recently offered for sale a 1d Second Sideface stamp perforated with the scarce perfin, SE&Co. It was stated to be fiscally used, bore part of the firm's name ("EWEN"), and had a price tag of \$200. Even at that price I missed out; my telephone call was more than half a day too late and the item had been already sold.

A search of the Auckland edition of "Wise's Directory" for 1900 and 1901 has been of no help. I could find no firms at all with the initials SE&Co, and only one firm which contain the name "Ewen." There are several possibilities. One is that the initials are those of the partnership, but that it traded under a different name. Another is that the firm was very small and went out of business almost as soon as it started. A third possibility is that the perfin (but with incorrect initials) was used at the Auckland branch office of Sargood, Son & Ewen. This firm used stamps perforated SSE at its Dunedin Head Office.

I could find only two individuals in the Auckland city area with the surname, Ewen. One of these two people had changed his address between 1900 and 1901 (perhaps suggesting a change of lifestyle and a new business involvement). But even this faint clue came to nothing and I could find no evidence to link this Mr Ewen with the initials SE&Co.

The perfin rather resembles a "one off" Victorian perfin and we know that Sargood, Son & Ewen had close connections with Melbourne, where other family members were in business. It would have been quite easy for the firm to have sent a few sheets of stamps to Melbourne for perforating. The incorrect initials would be explainable if Sargood, Son & Ewen was known, colloquially, as "Sargood Ewen & Co."

The mystery remains. Perhaps another fiscally used stamp, showing other parts of the name, remains to be found.

It was suspected that this perfin was used by Sharland & Co. Ltd, of Auckland. Mr W.G. Register, of Christchurch, has a copy of this perfin on cover, proving that this preliminary identification was in fact correct.

A PERFIN FROM THE ANTARCTIC



Stanley Gibbons New Zealand Ltd's auction of 11th December 1993 includes, as Lot 514, two postcards, one described as being franked with a New Zealand "ld Universal perfin (damaged)" postmarked "British Antarctic Expedition." I have been able to obtain a photocopy of this postcard. At the time of writing I am still wondering whether or not to bid; the estimate for the two cards is a cool \$500.

The stamp is perforated USSCo (used by the Union Steam Ship Company Ltd). It is, as described, "damaged" - badly so. It has in fact been torn in half, the two portions joined together, but in a very rough manner. A cut-out from the back of an envelope bearing an oval "S.Y. 'Nimrod'" marking dated FEB 23 1908 has been attached to the card, probably by the recipient. The only part of the date of the datestamp which I can read is part of the day, the figure "2." This, however, is more than enough. The stamp would be postmarked 27FE08, the date of the mail made up prior to the return of the "Nimrod" to New Zealand. A letter with the "Nimrod" backstamp was probably received by the addressee, a Mrs Gordon, in the same mail.

The Union Steam Ship Company was connected with Shackelton's 1908 expedition to the Antarctic; the "Koonyah" which accompanied the ship's to the edge of the pack ice before returning to New Zealand was a Union Steam Ship Company vessel. The "Nimrod" had called at Port Chalmers on its way south and a crew member may well have been asked to send a card to Mrs Gordon, or Mrs Gordon may have given the card to the crew member for posting. There are a number of possibilities.

The item is certainly of interest - the most southerly usage of a New Zealand perfin. But damaged? and \$500? I'm still thinking.

1d KANGAROO - WATERMARK SIDEWAYS PUNCTURED LARGE OS by L Cowman

The 1993 update of the Australian Commonwealth Specialists Catalogue featured a review of the Kangaroo and Map series.

Note 2 on page 2/21 de-listed the above item with the following comment:

" The previous listing included this variety punctured Large or Small OS but there is no evidence for the existence of these. "

Prior to receiving this update I had purchased the following item offered by Gabriele's Philatelic Service in the June 1993 Stamp News: " 1d Kangaroo Perforated Large OS Wmk Sideways- Fine Used, Scarce Item"

This stamp was shown to Rodney Perry, of the National Stamp Gallery. Examination did not reveal any reason to doubt it's authenticity.

The question remains as to the existence of this item with the small OS puncture.

AN UNCOMMON COMBINATION

(J. H. Mathews)

One of my regular correspondents, who has added considerably to details of perfins known at the time of publication of "Commercial Perfins of Australia", is Joe Laura who lives near Boston, USA.

Amongst his latest samples for me to study is a fine copy of a Tasmanian 3d. yellow duty stamp perforated with a strike of LLG.3 which is cleaner than the only one available when the book went to the printers.


As a matter of routine, I put the stamp under my magnifier to get a better look at the penscript date of cancellation and to my surprise found that the stamp also had an overprint, showing a crown with "TAS" underneath. The overprint appears to be in a pale blue ink, the paleness probably not due to fading because the stamp colour is brilliantly fresh.

photocopied the stamp, enlarging it and adjusting exposure to get optimum contrast between the overprint and the

background. Then, with the original and photocopy alongside each other under a magnifier, I manually enhanced the darkness of the overprint on the photocopy.

With the stamp design in the photocopy faded almost completely out, prominently visible are the strike of LLG.3, the diagonal penscript cancellation date 31/10/28, and the enhanced overprint.

In a recent letter Brian Dennis, a nonmember from South Africa, mentions an interesting item.

"It is an OS perfin on a KGV Australian. The stamp is a 4d orange of the 1914-21 series and appears to have a 1917 postmark on it, which fits. The cancellation is a very clear Cape Town Paquebot.

Have you any views or comparative experience as to how such a stamp could have been used in South Africa? I suppose an Australian Government representative could have been on route to England and wanted to mail letters when the ship stopped at Cape Town."
