TATTERSALL'S SWEEPSTAKES – A SOCIAL BAROMETER (John Mathews)

While horse racing has been named "The Sport of Kings", that title really only reflects the social group who can afford to own racehorses which take part. The gambling side of horse racing, as indeed of all forms of gambling, really relies on people's hope to "beat the odds" and perhaps even make one's fortune. It is probably true that Tattersall's Sweepstakes, which grew out of the economic depression of the 1890s, appealed largely to those desperate folk who tried to win a small fortune.

Recently, I bought a perfinitem on eBay which seems to reflect such a situation. It is a part cover front used in July 1904, with a 2d Tasmanian Pictorial with perfin A.2. On the reverse of this front is the following message:

"Mr. Addams Plis sur send me one ticit on the Metropolitan Stakes run about September 12, 1904. Yours truly," (name withheld – jhm)

The address seems to be a remote rural location, which I have not been able to find on either modern maps or gazetteers of the time.

For those who like all the details, the Metropolitan Stakes run in Sydney on Monday, September 12, 1904, was won by 4-y-o chestnut gelding "Alias", a 100-to-1 outsider, ridden by W. H. Smith and owned by Mr. James Chambers. Second place went to "Tartan" (4-to-1), and 3rd was "Cato" (25-to-1). The winner's prize was £2,480.

FUNNY BUSINESS IN WA (David Andersen)

David Coath has been given access to some information from the late Kevin Bliss's collection during its sale. He returned one of my letters to Kevin in 1992 relating to a number of perfin related issues plus a number of other documents of interest.

To me the most interesting item was a receipt from John Shaiak the Sydney Dealer in March 1952. The receipt was for

"Selected lot KGVI punctured W.A. mint (some imprints) incl. 3 copies 3d blue, Face value £5.12.0 ON APPROVAL £6.5.0.

Herewith another nice lot. Now we have only a small lot left. Should you still be interested please let us know and we will send the balance on approval. "

Considering that the WA perforator continued in use until 1954 the sale of this material which was still in use by Western Australian Government Departments is intriguing. Over the years there has been a fair number of KGVI mint issues, many in imprint blocks, for sale. Evidently there was a degree of interest in the W/A officials in the early 1950s. The range of mint material available is quite large. I remember purchasing a lot of mint WA perfins at auction in the early 1980's for around face value, including 18 different imprint blocks.



While we may never know how this mint material reached the public arena one does wonder if its existence is totally legitimate. There was also other funny business going on with the Western Australian issues around that time. George Owen records that almost all of the commemorative stamps from the 1½d Canberra onwards were punctured W/A at the request of a member of the Armed Forces of a certain Allied Nation in 1949. These "per favor" issues are encountered in mint condition and are quite scarce and were definitely not issued for Departmental use. It does appear that this person did not retain all of the issues so punctured as some have turned up in Australia since then. It would be very interesting to find out who this person was and what happened to the material punctured.



The cover illustrated was produced by Angus & Robertson, booksellers and stationers, of Castlereagh Street, Sydney, to promote the book "The Shackleton Expedition to the South Pole". It has a machine cancel date of July 3, 1909. The ½ d green stamp has perfin A&RLTD.1.



McP.2 – MISSING PINS, AN UPDATE (Ken Killeen)



ANOTHER PATTERN WHICH HAD SEVERAL PERFORATORS (John Mathews)

The pattern HSCO.1 of Howard Smith Co. Ltd., shipping agents, is listed in the catalogue as being used in the Commonwealth period, and in all States except Tasmania. Initially, this was thought to be the result of a single perforator in (head) office being used to puncture stamps for the various branches. However, closer inspection shows some consistent very minor variations in pin positions which suggest that each branch had its own perforator. The dies were no doubt produced from the same master template.

For those who wish to test their eyesight, the following are differences which I have discerned from enlarged images of many examples.



- Victoria top pin of left leg of 'H' bows slightly inwards (in all other dies, it is straight)
 - the 'o' is slightly shorter.
- South Australia the 'H' is slightly further to the left than for the other States. - pin S8 is slightly to the right compared with the others.


West Australia – the 'o' is slightly further away from the 'C' than for the others. - the pin C6 is positioned slightly higher.

I have not been able to identify any differences between the Newcastle and Brisbane strikes. The die illustrated is the Newcastle die.

CHRISTMAS PERFIN FROM CANADA

Illustrated below is a perfin-like emanation from Canada. While not a commercial or government perfin is still rather spectacular and I couldn't resist including it in a bulletin issue.



WHAT IS IT?


The item shown was recently sold on eBay. It looks like a stamp, but without any country indicated and no "currency". The inscription "POKO" ("POKO" stands for "Porto Kontroll") is consistent with the POKO-style letters of the "MS" perfin, and the cut top and bottom edges of the stamp. Such stamps were perforated by the Michelius stamp vending machines.



The item could be a significant piece of perfin history, and this is also suggested by the final selling price of US\$231!

AN ITEM OF POSTAL PERFORATING HISTORY

Bryan Magee has reported an photograph of philatelic interest which was in the May auction of Charles Leski (Melbourne). The lot is described as a 23 x 19 cm 1880s albumen photograph showing a man operating a perforating press. The photograph was entitled "GPO Stamp Branch" and was listed under the "Great Britain" section of the auction catalogue. Indeed, the lettering on the top of the box in the foreground appears to be "STAMP BRANCH". The mechanism is treadle operated and is very similar to that of the Australian "VG" perforator owned by your Secretary. The perforating head structure also looks similar to two other line perforators seen several years ago.




If the device was operated by the GPO Stamp Branch, it is most likely to be a line perforator, but also it could have been one used to perforate one of the GB official perfins. Peripheral points of interest are that the pieces of paper punched out appear to drop into nothing more "technical" than a cardboard carton; and no-one bothered to remove the weeds at the edge of the path to the left of the operator's foot before the photograph was made!

A COMPANY DATE CANCELLING PUNCH

The stamp shown was recently sold on eBay. The stamp is a Victoria 1d Duty Stamp, with manuscript cancel "14/2/83". The punch pattern is typical of many produced by Joseph Sloper & Co. of London, with the company initials surrounded by the date, day to the left, month to the right, and year underneath. The date and month could be changed using a set of removable dies supplied with the perforator, while the year die was produced as a separate item on request as part of Sloper's on-going business. The letters on this punch are "O/B.C" and the date is ".2/./83" (probably 12/2/83), consistent with the cancel.

The Oriental Bank Corporation was established in India by British interests, on the strength of usage of silver in that country at the time. The British tried to maintain silver as the standard in that area, rather than gold as elsewhere.



Eventually this bank went into liquidation at various times in different countries. In Melbourne, it had been at 50 Collins Street West in the 1870s, but went into liquidation in 1885 with the liquidators operating from 30 Queen Street for a couple of years after that.


PERFIN CTCO ON CUSTOMS DUTY STAMPS – AN UPDATE (John Mathews)

Thanks to submissions sent in by Bill Harley, Peter Wood, David Coath and eBay, the previous article on this subject in the October 2005 issue (page 3), based on examples held by Ken Killeen and myself, can now be updated to give time sequences for seven heads of this multi-head die. As the perforator was no doubt manufactured by The Cummins Co. of Chicago, it is most probably a 10-head device (model 53 – see illustration in SPPB April 2006, page 8). Any further examples from members will be welcome to try to complete the details.

In the "tree" shown, time increases downwards and the vertical background lines approximately align the position of the upright of the letter 'T' in each pattern. The one exception is for M.13/W.1 where the images are spread to show the adjacent edges of what might have been adjacent stamps! Some of the patterns have had to be traced as photocopies were too dark to reproduce as they were. Also, where patterns were obtained from scans the scaling might not be exactly consistent with other patterns. The outline boxes for each pattern show approximately how much overlap there is between the various strikes which enabled horizontal associations to be made. The overall link between the heads is given by the sequence K.13 – K.11 – H.1 – K.1 – K.6. Unconnected boxes between the various columns in a given row do not infer that they were in existence at the same time. As rows become more complete this detail may emerge.




Progressive degradation of the heads of the "CTCO" die used in London on Australian Customs Duty Stamps

A CURIOUS DOUBLE PERFIN STRIKE

Member David Coath has shown the item illustrated. Previously known double strikes (2 different patterns) are few, and have always been two Victorian Service Punctures, which is easy to explain. However, David's example has WILLS.1 and PL&B.12, both customized perforators. The question is, "How could this happen?" One answer might be that the companies did not actually have the perforators at their premises, but paid an agent to purchase the perforating dies and do the perforating for them, as Miss Dore Lough did for several companies in Sydney.

Another explanation might be that one company somehow perforated the stamp from the other's incoming mail. However, I think this rather unlikely. The strikes are both from the reverse of the stamp (a 1d green KGV, single wmk).



Any other theories?

A NEW IDENTITY – OR A PERFIN MYSTERY? (John Mathews)

In June, I was very keen to get the item shown which was offered on eBay, as the envelope was of W. Watson & Sons Ltd of Melbourne, suppliers of X-ray and optical equipment, and they were not a known perfin user. The vendor had kindly sent me a detailed scan of the stamp area, which showed perfin pattern VB.2, and none of the "VB" perfins had a known user.

However, a search of Melbourne Directories from 1920 to 1930 (the range of use of the various "VB" patterns, including this cover) revealed no association between the firm of Watson & Sons and any trade mark or brand, nor of any other firm with which they may have been connected either by business or as neighbours in Collins Street. The most obvious user of "VB" could be Victoria Brewery, but .. ?? Does any member have any theory about this?

(I was outbid in the last seconds and the cover went for US\$66.)

FRENCH POSTAL STATIONERY CARD, PERFINNED

Perfinned postal stationery items seem to be scarce for any country. The item shown was sold on eBay for US\$44. The perfin pattern is "PO", but from the message on the reverse, it seems that it was used privately. The black around the edge is background, not a mourning border.
