# PRESIDENT'S COMMENTS

Recently, a significant number of rare Official perfins have been listed on eBay by one seller in Sydney who has used a sequence of identities. The characteristics of these listings are as follows:

- Rare Official patterns offered with very low starting prices
- Private auctions with bidders names suppressed
- Low number of sales

His listings include some normal philatelic items, but in many instances this seller's perfin and overprint listings are forgeries. Considering the number of items involved and information from other collectors who have traded with, and observed, this seller, it appears that he is not only a distributor of forged items but is probably involved in their manufacture. These have included various Commonwealth OS's, OS/NSW type C and the hard-to-find OS type I of NSW.

I urge all members to be most careful in dealings with this type of material and forward email links of what you consider to be suspect listings to David Andersen and David Coath. Perfin collecting is especially vulnerable to forgers and this was evidenced in the past with the "VG" forgeries.

The best way to protect our collections from these "weeds" is to :

- Improve our references
- Share details about suspect patterns and traders
- Expose forgers to the authorities such as ebay, the APTA, etc.

In addition if you feel that you have suspect items in your collection then I am sure David Andersen (Officials), John Mathews (Private patterns) or Neale Scott ("VG") would be able to provide an opinion on them.

# CANADIAN CUSTOMS DUTY STAMP WITH PERFIN

The Canadian Customs Duty Stamp shown was sold on eBay in April 2010 for US\$8-72. It has perfin "DM/CO" of the Dennison Manufacturing Company of Boston, Massachusetts, USA. The same perfin is known on Australian Customs Duty Stamps (US version).



#### **AUCTION 1/2010**

This has been another very successful auction (190 out of 240 lots sold - 80%) with strong bidding especially for proving covers. Results are enclosed.

#### PROBABLE NEW USER IDENTITY (John Mathews)

In July 2010, the plain cover shown as sold on eBay. The 1½d red KGV stamp (just tied to the cover!) has perfin MG.1 for which a user identity has not yet been found.

However, the cover is addressed to "Jury-Metro-Goldwyn-Limited" in London and there would seem to be a strong possibility that the sender was the company's Sydney office. In Sydney Directories, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer is first listed in 1926. From the nature of the addressee, it would seem that the merging of the companies may have taken place in two stages – can anyone confirm this? If that is the case, the user of the perfin MG.1 would probably be "Metro-Goldwyn".


Our thanks to Richard Smolnicki for his good work in managing our NZ account, and also to Ray Bennett for his good work in managing the exchange books' NZ circuit.

#### NEW ZEALAND PERFINS: SOME RECENT FINDINGS (G.I. Robertson FRPSNZ)


### J/NATHAN/&CO

Samuel (1987,1998) and Mathews (2008) record this company as an Auckland firm. The company was established in Wellington by Joseph Nathan in 1873. A copy of this perfin has been recorded postally used at Wellington on 10 April 1885 (Dr A. Murley, pers. comm.). I can find no evidence of a branch being operated in Auckland and suggest the listing should read "J. Nathan & Co., Wellington (1885)".


Samuel (1968) stated he had only seen a single copy of this perfin and was unable to identify the place of use and user. He further wrote: "Mr G. Chamberlain of Wellington has advised: The late James Currie had a similar perfin in his collection, except there was one less hole in the middle arm of the design. A note over the specimen attributed it to Messrs Yaeger and Son. The design was apparently the letter 'Y' between parallel lines". A search of contemporary New Zealand directories reveals no person with this name. There was, however, J. George Yager &



Co. boot manufacturer of 36 Peterborough St, Christchurch in the 1910's.

### N. Z. / I. C.

Robert Samuel described punches used by the Union Steam Ship Co. and Smith & Smith Ltd (Samuel, 1998). A third punch was recently located at Archives New Zealand. When the original New Zealand Insurance Co was wound up about 1991 the firm lodged a large archival holding with Archives New Zealand. This institution is primarily a depository of the records of government departments and related organisations but, if space allows, is willing to accept material from private firms and individuals.





Figure 1. The New Zealand Insurance Co. punch retrieved from the Maryborough, Queensland office [courtesy: New Zealand Insurance and Archives, New Zealand / Te Rua Mahara o te Kawanatanga, Auckland].

The punch was retrieved from the Maryborough, Queensland, Australia office of the New Zealand Insurance Co. (type Pf. 58, Samuel 1968). Made of cast iron or steel, weighing about 1 to 1½ kg and, despite about 117 years old, it is in excellent working order (Fig. 1). No indication as to the name of the manufacturer/model could be found although the base has been punched with the letters "XI" or "IX". However, Mathews (1994) noted from official Queensland postal records "that the perforator used by the New Zealand Insurance Company was supplied by that firm's head office in New Zealand and made by Mordanne (sic) and Co. London". The name of the company was Sampson Mordan & Co., known to have manufactured perforating machines from 1879 to at least 1899.

## W McA

This perfin was first recorded by Samuel (1992) on a Second Sideface stamp with portion of a squared circle postmark reading "AUCKLAND --88". He was unable to suggest the identity of the user. A possible user is McArthur, William and Co., Importers and Warehousemen who had premises at 233 Queen Street, Auckland in 1888.



### SECURITY OVERPRINT

### B&B W

This overprint has been applied in black type to a surface printed Geo. V 2d orange, perf 14, probably on Cowan paper (Fig. 2). The stamp is fiscally cancelled with portion of a rubber stamp marking in purple reading "2? SEP 19-".

There is no evidence as to the identity of the user but perhaps we can assume the "W" represents "Wellington". A search of directories from late 1920's revealed the following possible users:

Brice & Brice [representing Hollington Bros], 90 Wakefield St Bonn & Braid, Plumbers, 209 Willis St Brown & Blackie, Real Estate Agents, 28 Hopper St. It is now 42 years since the Postal History Society of New Zealand Inc. published "New Zealand stamps with perforated initials" by the late Robert Samuel. A revised and updated edition of this basic guide to the perfins and security overprints used by New Zealand institutions, within New Zealand and overseas, will be published by that Society this year.

NEW ZEALAND STAMPS WITH PERFORATED INITIALS", 2<sup>nd</sup> edition, by Robert Samuel.

Advice has now been received from the Postal History Society of New Zealand Inc. that this publication referred to in the article above is now available. A "flyer" is enclosed for all NZ members of PCNZA (others who are interested can obtain a "flyer" from the PCNZA Secretary.) It has 90 A4 pages, includes both perfins and overprints, and is lavishly illustrated. It does NOT give a listing of all the issues on which each perfin pattern is known (but such a detailed listing is in the course of preparation by PCNZA). Cost is NZ\$27.00 within NZ, and for overseas buyers cost ranges from NZ\$33.28 (to Australia) to NZ\$41 (to UK and Europe).

#### TAMWORTH PERFIN SOUVENIR

200 sets (of 2) of the 1999 Navigators Minisheet with the A99 perfin were overprinted in Gold for The Tamworth Lions Club Collectables Fair and the Tamworth Philatelic Society Stamp Fair held at the Tamworth Town Hall from 19<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> February 2010. Sets of 2 were sold at \$30.

#### SPECIAL PERFINS FOR EXHIBITIONS (Frank Franchi)

I collect Italian perfins and can add to the known exhibition perfins mentioned in the article in the April 2010 Bulletin (page 3). I have scanned three postcards from Italian exhibitions:





Fig. 1b. 1946 Milan Exhibition mini-sheet (back)

- 1946 (Milan) perfin "MF/IM" one letter on each stamp) (figs. 1a and 1b),
- 1946 (Venice) perfin "RFPV.46" (figs. 2a and 2b),
- 1948 (Venice) perfin "R/F/P/V48" (figs. 3), and
- 1949 (Venice) perfin "R/F/P/V" (figs. 5a and 5b).




Fig. 4. Page from latest edition of "Perfin Italiani/Italian Perfin" (2009), E. Bertazzoli, B. Ermentini & G. Roncetti.

They are mentioned in the latest Italian Perfin Catalogue (fig. 4) [there is a copy in the club's library -jhm]


(Above) Fig. 5a. 1949 Venice Exhibition postcard (back). Note the perfin through the card under the first line of the address.

"SEEING DOUBLE" – MORE EXAMPLES

(John Tyson)

I have found 2 more examples of double strikes of "A" perfins on Tasmanian stamps to add to those shown in David McNamee's article in SPPB No. 58, July 2002. The first is a 2d Pictorial postmarked AP 18, 1900, with 2 inverted strikes of pattern A.1. The second is a 2½d "Tablet" postmarked "JL 23, 1900" with pattern A.2 as both left and right sideways strikes [could this one indicate that sheets of stamps were turned around/over to perforate the last rows/columns as was done with the "G/NSW" and "VG" punctures? – jhm]



#### POSSIBLE NEW IDENTITY

David Coath has reported a new "DA" pattern on a 1d red KGV tied to part of an envelope of McRorie & Co. Pty. Ltd., 262 Flinders Lane, Melbourne, by a May 1916 machine roller cancel. Daniel McRorie was born in Geelong in 1859 and died in 1934, aged 75 years. The company is first listed in the Melbourne Post Office Directory of 1898 at Degraves Street, and from 1900 is listed in Flinders Lane. They were variously described in subsequent years as "indentors", "warehousemen", "merchants", and "importers". In 1899, they applied for a patent relating to umbrellas. On 20 May 1921, their building at 262 Flinders Lane was gutted by fire, and on 6 June the following year the company went into voluntary liquidation. So far, no connection has been found between the perfin letters and the company.


#### STRIP OF 5 ENGRAVED KOOKAS WITH PERFIN



Status International auction 265 (May 2010), lot 1138

The used strip of 5 Engraved Kookas with Perfin DJLTD.2 was listed in Status International auction 265 in May 2010, but was unsold at 150 + GST, P&H, etc. To find such a large used multiple as this on this issue must be very rare. In addition, the strip has 6 complete strikes of the Perfin because the perforator was made on 23 March 1908 (Sloper serial number 60832) for the narrower New South Wales stamps.

The perforator had two rows each with 6 dies as shown in the image of the strike from Sloper's Workshop Impression Books shown below. Measurement of the positions of the dies indicate that the 6 dies on the strip of stamps above were from the same strike of one of the rows of the perforator.



Strike of perforator DJLTD.2 (serial number 60832) from Sloper's Workshop Impression Books


## SAVING COUPON FROM BALLARAT AND MILDURA

Dave Elsmore has come across an interesting private saving coupon used by James McKay & Sons Pty Ltd in Ballarat and Mildura with an FI or F1 perfin. Like all coupons when they were passed in at the issuing shop(s) and possibly stuck in a booklet they would have been destroyed. Could the perfin have been applied as a cancelling device to prevent reuse after redemption? While this is probably the reason most readily suggested, it probably is not the reason as coupons could have more easily (and cheaply) been cancelled with a pen or crayon.

Maybe the perfin was used to validate the coupons when they were issued or was used as additional security to prevent forgeries. Can anyone help towards solving this mystery? Possibly a sheet or booklet with coupons exists and if so may give us a better idea of why the perfin was used. Please contact the editor if you can help. A normal OS stamp is included in bottom illustration to show the size of the coupon.


